Hiring educators of color is just the first step. For staff of color to stay, schools need to be places that affirm the racial identities of staff and students of color so they can be their authentic selves. The same can be said for staff who have marginalized identities other than race.



A diverse group of 60 Wayland METCO students, resident students, parents, and staff stopped by historic cultural sites in Boston such as Malcolm X's home and The Freedom House. Other stops along the tour included: Bethel AME Church, Fowler Clark Epstein Farm, Jubilee Christian Church, the original site of METCO headquarters, National Center for Afro-American Artists, Prince Hall Grand Lodge, Rise/Gateway to Boston, Roxbury Community School Roxbury Community College, Roxbury Heritage State Park, and William Monroe Trotter House.
