

FY10 Budget: FinCom Guideline

- No override
- Level funded budget
- Only includes contract salary increases & small amount for utility and special ed increases



FY10 Budget: SC Budget Principles

- Deliver a high-quality educational program to Wayland's children.
- Place highest budgetary priority on personnel, budgeting for staff:pupil ratios in accordance with prevailing district policy, and on the supervision thereof, with an overall expectation that any budget reductions minimize the impact on student learning.
- Provide for the continued development of programs as designated in the curriculum review process and explore the possible creation of new programs.



FY10 Budget: SC Budget Principles

- 4. Respect the fiscal priorities of the Town by considering cost reduction, new revenue, and program redefinition, with attention given to such considerations as staff patterns, operational efficiencies, and cooperative ventures.
- Budget realistically, based on the needs of the system without the benefit of a contingency fund, for non-personnel items including materials, technology, maintenance, cleaning, and general operation of all school buildings.
- Advocate for significant equipment and building capital needs.



FY10 Budget: Enrollment Trends

- In FY09, continue to experience enrollment decline
 - 5th consecutive year district-wide
 - 8th consecutive year at elementary level
- Anticipate 58 fewer students for FY10

Kindergarten	- 13 students
Grades 1-5	- 36 students
Middle School	- 23 students
High School	+14 students

FY10 Budget: Looking Forward

- Principals are developing building level budgets
- Superintendent will review and consolidate into one budget
- Superintendent will recommend the budget to the SC – December 15th
- School Committee will conduct two public work sessions in early January
- Finance Committee will receive the budget in mid-January



Standardized Tests

In 2008, 149 Wayland High School students sat for the SATs, achieving mean scores of 582 in critical reading, 618 in math, and 595 in writing. On MCAS. Wayland Middle School Science was ranked fourth in the state (Boston Globe, 2008).

Advanced Achievement



Advanced Placement courses are offered in American History, Biology, Calculus, Latin, English, French, Spanish, Chemistry, and Physics. Advanced Placement exams are given in Music, Art, Psychology, Economics, Computer Science, and Statistics.

In 2008, 149 students sat for 272 tests encompassing 19 subjects. Grades of 4 and 5 comprised 82% of the scores.

Co-curricular Activities

Nearly 60 clubs, service organizations, and other activities are offered to Wayland Public Schools students throughout their journey through elementary school, middle school, and high school. The elementary schools invite students to participate in an annual performance, sing in the After School Chorus, or join the Boston Friends club. At the middle school level, students have the opportunity to take part in such activities as science and math clubs, two yearly drama productions, student council and community service activities, and school trips offered throughout the year. High school students can become involved in theatre, band and orchestra, science and math teams, French and Spanish clubs, and can contribute to their community in many ways such as participating in the School Climate Committee, Gay/Straight Alliance, or by helping others as peer advisors.



Middle school students are able to take part in intramural sports and may also join teams to play soccer, field hockey, track, baseball, softball, and basketball throughout the fall, winter, and spring athletic seasons. At the high school, student athletes can participate in team sports including lacrosse, track, wrestling, golf, swimming, and (of course), football. Wayland High School's football team has an outstanding record in the Dual County League.


Attendance

According to the Massachusetts Department of Education Indicators for 2007-2008, the average of absences in 2007-2008 was 6.0; the attendance rate for Wayland students was 96.5%.

Graduation

Compared with a state rate of 80.9%, more than 99% of the Wayland High School Class of 2008 graduated (out of 228 students, only one did not graduate).

Post-graduation Plans



- While most of the other finalists and winners enter many years before receiving such an award, Wayland
 Student Press was founded less than a year ago.
- Wayland Student Press is completely operated by students.
- Wayland Student Press is a small group of students working together. It is strictly extracurricular. Students do
 not get course credits or community service hours for working on it. Even without an allocated time on the
 school schedule, Wayland Student Press was able to compete with other student publications put out by larger
 staffs who are given periods during the school day to work on their publications.


